COURSE DESCRIPTION: Continuation of MAC 2311. Logarithmic, Exponential, hyperbolic, and inverse trigonometric functions, techniques of integration, partial fractions, area, trapezoid and Simpson's rules, volume, work; analytic geometry; Taylor approximations; sequences and series; polar representation of complex numbers. This is a General Education course.

PREREQUISITES: MAC 2311

GOALS. Some specific goals of the course are for you to:

- think critically (always a goal in mathematics classes);
- improve your capacity to remember and recall information
- communicate effectively, especially by writing precisely about technical things;
- improve logical thinking and problem-solving skills.
- learn how to view three dimensional objects.

TEXT: *Calculus, 11th Edition* Larson and Edwards, by Cengage.

ATTENDANCE/PARTICIPATION. You are responsible for all material covered in the lectures and assigned in class. Given the current state of affairs, I will take attendance to help determine your participation grade. However, I will be not counting up to 4 missed classes against your participation grade. I urge you to attend as often as possible.

GRADEBOOK. Canvas is NOT the official gradebook; I keep the gradebook. Use the point totals in canvas as a **guide** to your grade. See below for Grading.

HOMEWORK. Please read the sections in the book, and then complete the assigned **WebAssign** homework prior to the due date. **WebAssign** will be used to submit homework. Homework should be submitted by the posted deadline to get full credit. My default setting is that you will get 4 attempts on each HW, and your best score on each problem will be counted. Each HW problem has been assigned a value. **Webassign** does give partial credit. Your final grade in HW will be to take the total number of points earned divided by the total number of points assigned. (For the purpose of calculations, a **WebAssign** assignment that has “—Makeup” will not count towards the total points earned nor assigned.)

QUIZZES. There will be several canvas quizzes as well as in-class quizzes aimed at checking your daily and weekly progress and comprehension. These are also used to help ensure that you stay on top of the material. The point of the quiz is to give you practice in answering questions. You may use your notes and calculators to take the quizzes. But you are not allowed to work with others (either in the

class or not in the class). You should definitely NOT work together on the quizzes. There will be a deadline for the canvas quizzes. You will only be allowed to try the canvas quiz one time. Be sure to allot yourself enough time to complete the quiz in one sitting. There will also be quizzes given out in class. These will usually be short and only consist of one or two problems. If I happen to collect a written HW in class or assign a HW to be turned into canvas, the points will count towards in-class quizzes.

LATE POLICY. If you submit an assignment or canvas quiz to canvas after the deadline then you will receive at most 50% of your earned points. (I might choose to award 75% for those assignments turned in within an hour of the deadline. If I choose to do this then I will be consistent and treat everyone similarly.) In-class quizzes taken after the regularly scheduled time will be graded and you will receive 50% of your earned points. If you have a valid excuse (e.g. illness, school function) for taking an in-person quiz after the regularly scheduled time, I will award the full amount of earned points.

EXAMS AND MAKEUP POLICY. We will have two (2) tests and a comprehensive final exam. If you are not able to take an exam, I and only I, will approve a makeup exam. There should be a good reason and valid excuse for you not taking a test or an exam at its scheduled time. I also reserve the right to individually come up with a different plan versus providing a makeup exam.

CALCULATORS. You will not be allowed to use a calculator on in-person quizzes nor exams. Feel free to use any calculator for all HWs and Canvas quizzes. (See canvas for a list of online calculators.)

WEBASSIGN MAKEUP POLICY. If I decide to grant a makeup for a **WebAssign** assignment, the student should know that they will be allowed to complete the assignment past the deadline. If prior to the deadline, the student earned 50% or more of the available points, then redoing the assignment will allow the student to earn 70% of the missed available points. I will only give points earned over the number earned on the original assignment. This means you should redo the whole assignment. For example, if you earned 45 out of 60 points then you should redo the whole assignment to get 60 points in order to earn 70% of 15=60-45 points. (You will have already earned 45 points.)

POLICY ON INCOMPLETES. I am really striving towards not giving any incompletes. Incomplete grades will be assigned only in the case of a documented emergency or illness.

GRADING.

Your final grade will be determined by your scoring on the best of the following three schemes. I reserve the right to solely grade a particular student using exactly one of the grading schemes...meaning my choice. This will only be enforced in an atypical case; please see Academic Integrity and remember the Honor Code.

Policy on the Recording of Lectures

Recordings may not be used as a substitute for class participation or class attendance and may not be published or shared without the written consent of the faculty member. Failure to adhere to these requirements may constitute a violation of the University's Student Code of Conduct and/or the Code of Academic Integrity. Recorded lectures used for other purposes may allow the faculty member to seek "damages plus court costs and reasonable attorney fees, with the total recovery not to exceed \$200,000."
