**EVALUATION:** The goal of the class is for the students to do all of the assigned problems from the LPL book and submit them to the Grade Grinder. Please only do the HWs that are to be turned in via the grade-grinder. If the problem has a pencil next to it, I do not expect you to submit it. However, please try these problems and make sure you understand them.

The HW will be worth 100% of the final grade. Problems must be completed by the deadline date. Late homework will only receive 50% credit. There are approximately 250 HWs.

If a student instead prefers to take an exam in lieu of some homework, then the student needs to notify the professor. An exam will be worth 20% of the final grade, in which case the HW is deducted that amount. If a student takes two exams then the HW will be worth 60% of the final grade.

Exam 1 will cover Chapters 1-7 LPL. This must be completed by October 16th. Exam 2 will cover Chapters 8-13 LPL. This must be completed by December 5<sup>th</sup>.

In the case a student elects to take an exam, the student will be sent the exam via email, and have two hours to complete it and then scan it, and upload it to canvas. The exam will be proctored. Click here for student guidelines
